## LETTER FROM PRESIDENT & CEO AND BOARD CHAIR

## Dear Friends of Spaulding Academy & Family Services,

It has been a remarkable year. We made great progress in so many areas, despite facing significant challenges. During the 2023 fiscal year, we managed transitions in the key positions of CFO and Development, both of which have provided us with tremendous energy and talent in ways that we could not have anticipated. We overhauled our IT department and network, including the challenging tasks of adapting to new systems, platforms and protocols. We made huge improvements

to our campus infrastructure, beginning with facelifts and internal improvements to the cottages, and then renovating the second floor of the Cutter-Wiggins building. In addition, we secured bond funding for an exciting and much-needed addition to the school, which included relocating our kitchen and dining areas in the process. The work continues as we began the renovation of the Westwood (former dining) and Howe (art) buildings and developed plans to repair/replace the Cutter-Wiggins conference room. As if that wasn't enough, we built a state-of-the-art adaptive playground and expanded our medically intense program in the school. We're not done.

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## STRATEGIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS

## Building Critical Teams to Support Success of Students, Children, and Staff

### Training and Development

The Spaulding Academy & Family Services Training and Development group celebrated its first anniversary in September. The group supports its Family Services team and ensures quality training standards campuswide.

Team members include Moss Hartwell as Training Coordinator to manage the team and oversee its efforts; Kristin Cain as Residential Trainer, delivering a wide variety of trainings to Family Services staff that are both required by law and meet best practices in caring for children and their families; Liz MacLeod as Residential Onboarding Specialist, working directly with candidates seeking employment at Spaulding Academy & Family Services and supporting new hires through the onboarding and training process; and Devyn Vachon as the team's Training and Human Resources Administrative Assistant, providing the trainers with logistical tracking and follow-up to ensure trainings and staff development requirements are accurate and current.

### **Permanency Team**

The Permanency Team for Spaulding Academy & Family Services officially launched in March after a year in development and is already showing success and growth. Permanency specialists Cheryl Consoletti and Ashley Fenimore provide wrap-around support for youth from the start of admissions to up to six months after discharge to enable the youth to have long-term success. They work collaboratively with the child, their family, healthcare providers, community resources, the school administrative unit (SAU), and state departments, such as the NH Division for Children Youth and Families, Child Protection, and Juvenile Justice to ensure the child has access to the appropriate services and support throughout treatment and after discharge.



This dynamic team works to identify and fulfill the needs of the child and their family, whether it becomes reunification, foster home placement, rebuilding family systems, overcoming skill deficits, or simply providing information and connections to assist the transition. The team is familiar with every residential student and many of the youth will become familiar with both specialists as well, to support permanency-driven treatment as a team effort. Prior to the Permanency Team, kids only had 30 days of aftercare from various case managers when they left the program, and the re-admission rate was quite high. Now, once a child is discharged, the team works as liaisons to bridge services and are on call for questions, offer clarification to on-campus experiences, and more, for up to six months. Each case offers a different level of engagement and involvement. A youth's transition is softer with this program because now there is preplanning to set the youth up for success as they return to their families, communities, and schools. Each child's permanency plan remains at the forefront throughout enrollment, and data is collected and analyzed to measure the success of the initiative. We've already seen a handful of successful adoptions this year with the cases having six months of aftercare!

### Resource Guide

Transitional Social Worker Brittany Labonte, MS, CMHC, joined the team in October and is helping to develop a resource guide as an additional way to improve outcomes and opportunities for every child – and their families – once they return home.

The resource guide will be a catchment for areas where Spaulding Academy & Family Services children are served, such as Manchester and Hillsborough, providing details about services available to children and families for free, through insurance, or other means. These resources may include food banks, vocational experiences, in-home supports, and skill-building opportunities for parents and children.



All departments on campus will have digital access to the resource guide so staff can expand their understanding of community resources while improving networking opportunities and relationship building between those organizations and Spaulding Academy & Family Services. The resource guide may also serve to open doors for students to access different educational, career, and community involvement paths!

## Leadership Team Expands

The Board of Directors of Spaulding Academy & Family Services named two new directors to the organization's executive leadership team in 2023.

Courtney Constant became the organization's Director of Development and Community Relations. Prior to this role, she was Director of Operations at Lake Life Realty - Compass New England since 2018, where she led the agency's team to raise over \$200,000 for Make-A-Wish New Hampshire and continues to volunteer on the Rafting for Wishes event planning committee. Constant holds a master's degree in human relations and a bachelor's degree in psychology from Plymouth State University.

Nick Silva was promoted to Director of Admissions. Since joining Spaulding Academy & Family Services in 2014, Silva was successful in several roles across campus, including Academic Aide, Paraprofessional, Residential Counselor and Associate Teacher. This experience made him uniquely qualified to earn a promotion to Admissions Assistant in 2017. As the Admissions Assistant, he worked closely with each department on campus to lead tours, follow up on new students' progress and be a part of the Spaulding enrollment process from start to finish.

Silva holds an MBA from Southern New Hampshire University and a bachelor's degree from Elms College.

## EchoVantage Launch

Spaulding announced its adoption of a highly integrated and intuitive behavioral health record management system this year. As of mid-November, all clinical medical, billing, incident reporting, and admissions data for each child is now accessible on a single platform in EchoVantage. This secure and streamlined real-time

system is designed specifically for behavioral health and has eliminated the need for the three separate databases previously used on campus for documentation management.

Thanks to the talent and commitment of Spaulding staff members – especially Digital Learning Specialist Charley Suter, who wrote SQL databases and built reports to tailor EchoVantage to Spaulding's requirements, and Quality Improvement Coordinator Carol Sanborn, who is leading administrative training in the system – employees, parents, and foster families will have the opportunity to access information more efficiently.

All data for past and current students has been imported into EchoVantage, and ChartMeds, the student electronic medication administration record (EMAR) program, now interfaces with it. EchoVantage will be used across all of Spaulding's programs, including Residential, Academic, Community-Based, and ISO Foster Care.

## **ACADEMIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

## **Academy Expansion**

The Board of Directors and leadership team for Spaulding Academy & Family Services spearheaded campus growth this year with a few projects.

The biggest was the addition of 17,000 square feet to the original Academy building, significantly expanding the size of the school. Students and staff have two new classrooms, a technology wing, conference rooms, 18 offices, and treatment rooms. As part of this project, the dining hall and kitchen moved from Westwood Hall to Spaulding Academy, offering students more convenient access to meals while at school.

In addition to the Academy expansion, we also completed renovation to the second floor of Cutter Wiggins, which expanded and updated existing office space, as well as converted storage space into additional much needed office space.

## Experiential Challenges Outdoors (EChO)

Spaulding Academy's Experiential Challenges Outdoors (EChO) program continued to create more opportunities for kids to revel in the outdoors this year!

The arrival of five full-suspension mountain bikes and four paddleboards enables additional skill development paths for our students. The new bikes allow skilled older kids to further develop their riding, jumping, and stunt skills on dirt trails. The new paddleboards are more efficient for smaller students to maneuver and earn confidence more quickly. Construction of two mountain bike flow trails - featuring rollers, berms, and small tabletop jumps - are already being designed to enable kids to learn, practice, and continue to hone their skills for real mountain biking trail adventures.



## **New Curriculum Advancements**

Thanks to the innovation of Brittany Rozen, RDN, LD of the Health Services team and Spaulding Academy leadership and teachers, the children have a new outdoor experiential learning opportunity on campus. The 30'x 40' teaching garden features bell peppers, hot peppers, carrots, corn, cucumbers, green beans, lettuce, pumpkins, squash, snap peas, tomatoes, basil, and edible flowers, including sunflowers.

Along with integrating education across subjects, the garden provides a sensory-friendly, hands-on opportunity to learn where food comes from, how to grow food, and to taste new, freshly picked produce.

In addition to the garden, we now have two chicken coops on campus: one by the Community Center and another by Wednesday House. Both coops have 12 chicks for the children to help feed and watch grow. Children help gather eggs and use them for food preparation on campus.

In addition to these outdoor curriculum elements, Spaulding Academy also implemented the Buddy Classrooms initiative which is blossoming. These classrooms are paired so that students can work together for various outcomes, including the Choose Love Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) activities every morning. Buddy Classes also participate in field trips, complete campus activities, cook lunch together, and more. Two classrooms even partnered on a science fair project!

The Buddy Classrooms are selected based on which students would be the best fit. Beyond considering factors like age and interest, teachers match students from across the spectrum of learning disabilities so that regardless of their individual challenges, all students can partner and create meaningful relationships and friendships. While it is always a valuable experience for students to expand their educational network and learn directly from their peers, the Buddy Classrooms are especially meaningful to build in-person connections - the very backbone of our strong Spaulding community!

## RESIDENTIAL ACCOMPLISHMENTS

## First Annual Prom

Spearheaded by our Activities Committee, we were proud to host an extraordinary event aimed to give our teens a taste of a quintessential youth experience: prom!

To support inclusivity, all teenagers on campus were invited to attend, and invitations were also extended to public-school peers.

Thanks to generous donations, we were able to provide an end-to-end magical evening for our prom attendees. Dresses and suits were donated for special event attire and a classy Cadillac provided rides around campus! Volunteers from staff

and families decorated our community center, prepared a delicious buffet, and took on roles of DJs, hairstylists, makeup artists, and more. Our devoted staff even embraced the spirit of prom by dressing up for the occasion and joining in the grand celebration!



We're especially proud of Lambert cottage manager and activities leader Salena Durette, who led the committee in creating this spectacular event. Each attendee now has a treasure-trove of memories and pictures from this uplifting and positive event.

## House Managers: Lifeblood of Residential Living

Residential house managers play a critical role that is difficult and demanding while being the lifeblood of our residential program. A house manager's responsibility is to advocate and care for our kids through empathy, remaining calm under pressure, and thinking on their feet. However, that's not all.

Our house managers engage in just about every facet of the cottages, including onboarding, training, and supporting staff and facilitating communication across the organization. They support each other across campus as needed for crisis management, day trips, vacations, and more.



They are constantly presented with new scenarios that require them to make decisions on the fly in real time! They have a positive impact in all areas of our campus with a dedication that extends beyond a normal 9-5 workday.

Each cottage has one manager and each of our current managers was promoted from within Spaulding! The cottages and managers are: Colcord – Rich Farquhar; Lambert – Salena Durette; Davis – Hernerce Popo; Wednesday – Wes Cannon; Young House – Dakota Lane; and Cutter Wiggins – Nicole Brizer. Lane and Brizer are the newest managers, replacing our two most tenured house managers who were promoted into new roles on campus based on their experience and proficiency.

## Holiday Traditions and Magical Memories

Up to 75% of Spaulding Academy & Family Services residential students lack holiday traditions or community meals with their families. To this end, our residential house managers strive to celebrate ALL holidays and help our kids have a traditional holiday experience. We have a campus-wide (and VIP invite-only guest) Thanksgiving as well as Christmas morning in the cottages. There is also an annual Halloween trick-or-treating on campus, holiday parties for all major holidays all year long. Holiday celebrations are another area where our residential house managers go above and beyond for their students, to make sure every student feels included and makes magical childhood memories.



## **COMMUNITY-BASED ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

## **Block Party**

On May 6th, Spaulding Academy & Family Services celebrated foster families by hosting a Caregiver Block Party in collaboration with NH's Division for Children, Youth, and Families (DCYF). Attended by 300 kids and families, the joyful event showcased existing foster families in NH and sought to inspire new foster volunteers.

The event provided an excellent in-person opportunity to connect after a few years of virtual events. Festivities included face painting, a petting zoo, various program supports, and delicious BBQ.

Spaulding Academy & Family Services and Granite State College are collaborating on a curriculum with specialized training tracks for existing foster families, ensuring tailored support to meet each family's specific needs.



On May 21st, Spaulding Academy & Family Services Community Based team held a Foster Family Appreciation event in honor of National Foster Care Month. This event brought foster families and their foster children – some of whom have been adopted – together for a fun celebration.

They shared a garden planting activity, games (including a giant Connect Four and an oversized ring toss), food, and companionship. This great event enabled children to meet other kids in similar circumstances and for families to make meaningful connections and expand their support network.

Next year, the Community Based Programs team hopes to host a large-scale event on campus with other agencies, including DCYF.

## Your Love Can Make a Difference

New Hampshire greatly needs foster families to love and support the many children in state care, and Spaulding's Community-Based team is helping to connect them. As a licensed Child-Placing Agency, Spaulding's Individual Service Option (ISO) Foster Care Program provides foster homes for children and youth ranging in age from birth to 18. The team recruits, trains, and licenses foster parents, and assists families with support services.

### Creative Authors Tea

### Arts Festival

In December 2022, Spaulding Academy enjoyed its first in-person Arts Festival performance since 2019. With support from Art and Music Teacher Robyn Allen and Visiting Artist TJ Wheeler, the children created artistic materials that were used during the festival. They acted, danced, played music, and sang on stage for their fellow students, teachers, and invited guests.

The Arts Festival theme was "Ubuntu," a South African humanist philosophy that focuses on relationships. This word means, "I am because we are, together as one." Each classroom created their own songs, plays, or visual art based on this theme.

They also connected the theme to the "Choose Love" curriculum used campuswide. The staff and students of Spaulding Academy look forward to creative opportunities like these in the years to come.



Spaulding Academy & Family Services held its annual Winter Carnival, an outdoor experiential learning event hosted by the Academy's Experiential Challenges Outdoors (EChO) program in March. Leading up to this year's event, children built their own sleds and decorated them using the 2023 "Choose Love" theme.

Additional Winter Carnival events included a tube park, sledding, ski demos, a snowshoe race, snow art and building, and snow croquet. Children also had the opportunity to participate in carnival games including a snowball toss, a "catch-a-duck" fishing activity, and a moose ring toss. Hot chocolate and cookies were available in Spaulding's brand-new canvas bell tent!

### Science Fair

On April 12th, we hosted our annual Science Fair so that the Spaulding Academy students could showcase the outcomes of their months of work in the classroom. This exciting event provides an opportunity for young Spaulding Academy students to explore their curiosity about the world around them. Students can practice scientific inquiry and experimentation, as well as develop presentation and communication skills as they explain their projects to visitors.

Project topics included the power of yelling at plants to promote growth, the effects of meteorites impacting earth, the influence smell has on the taste of food, and much more. Every child earned medals and ribbons for their display and report.

## ADAPTIVE PLAYGROUND GRAND OPENING

We did it! On Friday, June 23rd, with beautiful weather and picturesque scenery, we celebrated the momentous grand opening of our new 10,308-square-foot adaptive playground - one of the largest inclusive play opportunities in New England!

With careful consideration and expertise from Spaulding occupational therapists, physical therapists, teachers, residential staff, and facilities team, the entire Spaulding Family worked together with our partners Miracle Recreation and Pettinelli & Associates to build a playground that would be inclusive and fun for everyone.

This impressive playground, located behind the Lambert Building right on Spaulding's campus, features a wide variety of carefully selected adaptive and accessible equipment that will help children develop balance and motor skills, while enjoying social time with friends. Many of the features are sensory-friendly and all were chosen for their benefits to children of every ability.

Seeing the unbridled joy on each child's face at the grand opening was worth every conquered challenge! Everyone will remember them racing down the hill from behind Lambert Building, shrieking with excitement as they explored the playground's features while our intrepid staff followed close behind.

The playground has wheelchair-friendly-poured rubber surfacing and sun protection shades to provide strategic coverage for children with light and heat sensitivities. The Inclusive Whirl quickly became a fast favorite – a flush-to-theground, multi-person spinner designed for direct accessibility. This feature can fit two wheelchairs and also offers a seat for caregivers or other children.

Another popular choice was the Accelerator Swing. This fun feature allows multiple kids to share the fun and freedom of a group ride through the air on a large disc seat mounted on a frame. The uniquely designed Avalanche Inclusive Slide lets kids access the slide from the ground and use side rails to pull themselves up to their desired locations.

We've gained another step on the way to provide every one of our children the opportunity to experience a childhood full of joyful play and just enjoy being a kid.




# FACTS AND FIGURES

Spaulding Academy & Family Services is a leading provider of educational, residential, therapeutic and community based programs and services for families, and children and youth with neurological, emotional, behavioral, learning or developmental challenges, including Autism Spectrum Disorder and those who have experienced significant trauma, abuse or neglect. Established in 1871, Spaulding Academy & Family Services is a tax-exempt 501(c)(3) nonprofit that was formerly known as Spaulding Youth Center since 1958. Our scenic hilltop campus is located on over 500 acres in Northfield, NH and welcomes youth from ages 4 through 21 from around the state of New Hampshire and beyond. In addition to programs provided on our Northfield campus, Spaulding's community based programs include foster family licensing, Individual Service Option (ISO) foster care, ISO in-home services, child health support services, and more for children ages 0 to 21 and their family.

## Spaulding Academy & Family Services

- Managed by a President/CEO and Executive Leadership Team with governance provided by a Board of Directors.
- Our legacy began in 1871 as the New Hampshire Orphans Home and School for Industry, which later was renamed as the Daniel Webster Home. In 1958, this organization merged with the Golden Rule Farm (Est. 1914) to become Spaulding Youth Center. To best represent the evolution of available programs and services, the organization became Spaulding Academy & Family Services in 2020.
- Funding primarily provided from referring New Hampshire school districts, Bureau of Children's Behavioral Health (BCBH), Division for Children, Youth and Families (DCYF), Dept. of Education (DOE) and counterpart agencies from other states.
- The Spaulding Youth Center Foundation Endowment was founded in 1986 to raise funds to support the programs, values and goals of Spaulding Academy & Family Services, its sole beneficiary.
- Private donations and grants from individuals, foundations and community organizations help fund activities, projects and programs that directly benefit the children in our care, which are not afforded through public funding.



Since inception, Spaulding Academy & Family Services has supported more than 47,500 exceptional children and family members toward successful futures – and continues to have a deep and recognizable societal impact. Its commitment to ensuring every child has a childhood has ripple effects evident in the successful, well-adjusted prior students who live active, independent, and positive lives – despite the challenges they experienced prior to their time at Spaulding Academy & Family Services.
