THE CHOOSE LOVE MOVEMENT

Spaulding Becomes First Ever Choose Love Certified Campus



The positive energy at Spaulding is palpable.
Laughter fills the halls, expressive artwork covers the walls, students celebrate who they are, and staff members are close knit and supportive.

Principal Garrett Lavallee gives much of the credit to the Choose Love Movement. "As an educator, I have never believed in anything more than this program," he said. Founded by Scarlett Lewis after she lost her son in the Sandy Hook Elementary School tragedy, the Choose Love Movement provides free Character Social Emotional Development programs to create safe, nurturing environments. The Choose Love Movement emphasizes open discussions, celebrating successes, and thoughtful responses to challenges in day-to-day life.

Since Garrett became principal and director of special education in April 2022, Choose Love has become a way of life at Spaulding and, beginning in September 2022, has been integrated into the overall curriculum. In July 2024, Spaulding became the first Choose Love Certified campus in the nation. The certification recognizes best practices to foster a safe and compassionate environment by implementing and practicing Choose Love effectively.

Since Spaulding adopted the philosophy of Choose Love, crisis behaviors have decreased by 35 percent and standardized test scores have increased. Garrett has not been surprised at the tremendous results, feeling that it makes sense that "students need to be happy and stable in order to learn."

Spaulding is collaborating with the Choose Love Movement team to help other schools learn about and potentially implement the Choose Love framework and is now offering the first Choose Love Masterclasses in the country. The masterclasses teach every Spaulding staff member, from groundskeepers to administrators, the tenets of Choose Love – Courage, Gratitude, Forgiveness and Compassion in Action. "Choose Love is not just for kids. It is really a way of life, a way of culture, and a way of community," Garrett explains.

Staff Spotlight: Nick Lefebvre



Nick Lefebvre, our Director of Health Services, has such a passion for helping others and healthcare that he seems born to be in the health services field. Surprisingly, this wasn't always his path.
