



Established in 1871, Spaulding Academy & Family Services is a tax-exempt 501(c)(3) nonprofit and the oldest child care organization in operation in the United States. Our scenic hilltop campus is located on over 500 acres in Northfield, NH and welcomes youth ages 3–22 from around New Hampshire - and beyond.

We are a leading provider of educational, residential, therapeutic and community-based programs and services for families, children and youth with neurological, emotional, behavioral, learning or developmental challenges, including autism spectrum disorder and those who have experienced significant trauma, abuse, or neglect.

In addition to programs provided on our main campus, Spaulding's community-based programs include foster family licensing, Individual Service Option (ISO) foster care, ISO in-home services and child health support services for children ages 0–21 and their families.

- Purchased a new building in Tilton to enable the Community-Based Services team to better serve children and families with resources in the community
- Presented at and attended industry conferences, published the Spaulding Limitless Learning podcast, participated in an adaptive ski program for students, welcomed a new member of our team, Millie the therapy dog, and so much more!

It has certainly been a busy year — one in which we’ve seen firsthand the power and possibility of our extraordinary community.

Academic Accomplishments

Spaulding Academy, providing special education for grades K-12, celebrated community with these key events and milestones.



100% Compliance Rating

This year, Spaulding Academy received a 100% compliance rating from the New Hampshire Department of Education during our recertification process, which ensures that curriculum, policies and procedures are compliant with state and federal standards. During this process, each student's Individualized Education Program (IEP) was audited to guarantee that all special education and related services are provided as identified. Four areas set Spaulding apart: modeling Choose Love for the nation, including students in staff interviews and school decisions, a well-organized system of documentation of services, and investing in staff health and well-being.

Annual School Science Fair

A yearly favorite, this event encourages our students to explore scientific concepts through careful hypothesis testing. Students presented their projects to family, friends and the local community, building confidence while exhibiting knowledge. Student-selected experiments ranged from balloon-powered cars to lemon-powered batteries and covered a wide array of scientific topics.



First Student Appreciation Day

After a curious student wondered why there was an annual Staff Appreciation Day but no Student Appreciation Day, a new Spaulding tradition was born. The student pitched the plan to Principal Garrett Lavallee, who wholeheartedly embraced the idea. The first Student Appreciation Day included a ribbon-cutting ceremony and handwritten notes of appreciation from teachers to students. We look forward to this annual event in the years to come!



Adaptive Skiing at Gunstock

Skiing and winter sports are a core part of New England childhoods and help to build courage and confidence. This winter, we were thrilled to extend this opportunity to students of all abilities by collaborating with Gunstock Mountain Resort's Adaptive Ski Program. Gunstock's skilled instructors and adaptive ski equipment ensured everyone could experience the magic of this classic winter sport. Our participation in this program reflects our belief that every child deserves a childhood and the opportunity to take on challenges, no matter their physical abilities or limitations.



Spaulding's New Therapy Dog

This year, we welcomed a new team member to campus: our school's certified therapy dog. Millie, an English cocker spaniel, has undergone extensive training for her role and visits Spaulding with her owner, Laurie Belanger, once a week. She is a calming presence, reducing stress and anxiety and encouraging social interaction. Millie's positive impact on campus has already been profound, with some students sharing smiles and conversations for the first time.

Residential Accomplishments

Spaulding's Residential Program, which provides a safe and nurturing home away from home, celebrated a new gym, autism awareness and a fun fall season.



Newly Renovated Campus Gym

The Spaulding community celebrated the long-awaited renovation of our on-campus gym in the summer of 2025. Our Board of Directors joined us in July to tour the refreshed space and explore the new equipment and games, some of which were generously donated by our friends at Franklin Savings Bank. The renovated gym has been filled with student smiles, laughter and cheers as our community comes together to enjoy a space where children can run, play, exercise and simply be themselves.

Second Annual Sensory Party

On April 2, we hosted our second annual Sensory Party in honor of World Autism Awareness Day. Our community came together to learn about the importance of raising awareness, acceptance and inclusion of individuals with autism and improving their quality of life. Attendees enjoyed a wide array of sensory-friendly activities, including kinetic sand, playdough, bubbles, shaving cream, and rice and bean stations.



Special Olympics

This summer, the Spaulding Shooting Stars team learned valuable lessons of sportsmanship and teamwork by participating in the Special Olympics New Hampshire summer events. Our students eagerly cheered each other on and competed in shot put, long jump, shooting baskets and more alongside other teams. While fun was the goal, many of our students took home medals, which they proudly wore as they returned to campus. Participation in sporting events like the Special Olympics offers a unique opportunity for students to compete in a safe environment that fosters lasting confidence.



Fall Fun Celebrations

Our staff went all out to create classic childhood experiences as we celebrated fall and the spooky season. We kicked off autumn by visiting a local orchard to enjoy the crisp New England air and pick apples. Back on campus, students used their creative skills to carve pumpkins that lit up our school and their cottages. It wouldn't be Halloween without a little fright, and our amazing volunteers helped us to put on a zombie-themed Haunted Hayride that filled the fall air with screams, giggles and joy. Students trick-or-treated throughout campus and our staff competed in their third-annual Staff Halloween Costume Contest, dressing up as everything from SpongeBob characters to Choose Love Heroes.



Community-Based Accomplishments

Our innovative work to help children often comes from thinking outside the box, especially when supporting our foster and adoptive families.



Mikey's Success Story

When a clinician in our Foster Care Program noticed that foster child Mikey loved music and sound, she quickly incorporated his passion into her work with him. Previously noncommunicative, Mikey blossomed with this change in treatment and soon he was participating in community music classes. Mikey had found his voice!

When Mikey was first placed with his foster family, he struggled with eye contact, communication, tantrums and connecting with others. Through their commitment to his growth and continued collaboration with Spaulding case managers, Mikey is now able to attend public school, participate in children's choir and speak in full sentences. Mikey's success story shows the impact that a committed foster family working closely with Spaulding's Foster Care Program can have on a child's life when they collaborate.



Expansion with Purchase of Tilton Building

This year, Spaulding purchased two buildings on the Tilton-Franklin town line, marking an exciting step forward in expanding our community-based services. One of the buildings now houses our Community-Based Program staff, following an impressive renovation completed by our in-house facilities team. The second building provides a wonderful opportunity to further grow and enhance our services for children and families across New Hampshire.



Community Dinner on Campus

Students, staff, families and friends came together in our campus cafeteria on March 29 for our first Community Dinner. Every student was joined by someone special, creating a wonderful opportunity to celebrate our community, share laughter and enjoy meaningful time together. This inaugural event embodied Spaulding's values in a fun way, and we look forward to making it a cherished annual tradition.

Comprehensive Foster Care (CFC) Program Pilot

Amanda Champagne, Vice President of Family Services at Spaulding, along with her team, worked closely with the Department of Health and Human Services to pilot this game-changing foster care program for youth on the spectrum or with disabilities who need continued care into adulthood. Typically, a young adult would need to stay in a residential facility until they are eligible to access adult services, but Spaulding's new CFC program aims to reduce these stays. Amanda, working with external partners, has identified a network of licensed adult service providers and is training them to provide foster homes for these Spaulding residents. In February 2025, the CFC program proudly placed its first student in an adult foster home. Spaulding continues to build the program's capacity while carefully matching placements to each young adult's needs.



Spaulding Team Presents at the International Conference for Special Educators



Spaulding was honored to be invited to join more than 4,000 special educators from around the world at the Council for Exceptional Children (CEC) 2025 convention in Baltimore in March 2025. Principal and Director of Special Education, Garrett Lavallee, and Lead Behavioral Analyst, Tom Benjamin, presented “Spaulding Academy Choosing Love: Addressing Complex Special Education Students through the SEL Lens” at a standing-room-only breakout session.

“It was a competitive process to be selected as a speaker, so we were honored to just be able to present. To fill the room and have people watching from the hallway was incredible,” Garrett said.

As a leader in New Hampshire and the nation’s special education space, our team was grateful for the opportunity to give back and connect with the special education community, sharing the importance of humanizing education and taking a person-centered approach to support both staff and students. Research has shown that the staff’s Social Emotional Learning (SEL) is a key indicator of student success. Garrett and Tom reinforced this research with data from Spaulding showing reductions in restraints and an increase in academic performance as a direct result of embracing Choose Love and creating a safe, loving, nurturing environment for all on campus. For many audience members, Garrett and Tom’s presentation was the first time they had heard of the Choose Love Movement, and they were eager to learn more.

Spaulding staff members Bridget Desjardins, Stephanie Capen, Gina Wheeler, Charles Suter and Tammy Champine joined Garrett and Tom at the conference and were on hand to answer questions after the presentation. “As principal, I am surrounded by brilliant people who have so much to share. It was powerful to have a teacher from our team answer questions from teachers in the audience and our School Social Worker share tips with others in a similar position,” commented Garrett.

After the presentation, conference participants frequently stopped the Spaulding team to ask questions, and two exhibitors said that attendees had told them that the presentation was their favorite offered at the three-day conference. School districts continued to reach out after the conference to learn more about the Choose Love curriculum and connect with the Choose Love program.

Garrett, Tom and the Spaulding team are justifiably proud of their presentation at the CEC Convention. Garrett still marvels at the experience, saying, “It was pretty incredible to represent our little school on a hill in New Hampshire and share the magic that’s happening on our campus in front of a worldwide audience.”

Quick Facts

Spaulding is a 501(c)(3)

organization managed by a president/CEO and executive leadership team with governance provided by a board of directors.

Our legacy began in 1871

as the New Hampshire Orphans Home and School for Industry, which later was renamed as the Daniel Webster Home. In 1958, this organization merged with the Golden Rule Farm (Est. 1914) to become Spaulding Youth Center. To best represent the evolution of available programs and services, the organization became Spaulding Academy & Family Services in 2020.

Our funding primarily comes from
